LGBTQ2S SAFE, INCLUSIVE & AFFIRMING SHELTER SPACES



MAIN RECOMMENDATIONS FOR SHELTER PROVIDERS

A large part of the solution involves shifting and transforming the culture of the shelter system and support services, so that the entire system is safe for everyone accessing it.

Shelters and support services need to be equipped with appropriate resources, learning tools, and posters on the walls, such as information about sexual and gender identity and information about coming out as LGBTQ2S, so that queer and trans youth see themselves reflected in all aspects of programs, from the intake forms, to the messages on the walls, to the fliers in the lobby.



MANDATORY AND ONGOING LGBTQ2S CULTURAL COMPETENCY TRAINING FOR EVERYONE WORKING IN THE SHELTER SYSTEM

PROGRAMS FOR LGBTQ2S YOUTH THAT FOSTER AN INTERSECTIONAL APPROACH



Support the development and delivery of culturally-specific programming for LGBTQ2S youth. These programs should provide cultural connectedness and access to cultural traditions and practices, including: newcomer/immigrant LGBTQ2S youth; LGBTQ2S youth of colour; and two-spirit Indigenous youth.



DEVELOP A STANDARDIZED MODEL OF CARE

- Inclusive intake forms and processes
- All shelters should be equipped with appropriate resources and learning tools (information about coming out as LGBTQ2S, sexual and gender identity etc.)
- Creating an accessible and anonymous method for youth to lodge formal complaints
